



PUBLIC POLICY MATTERS

The gun related mass murders continue at the same or even an increased pace.

There have been 18 in April already as I write this on April 13. For further information on gun violence, check out the Gun Violence Archive at https://www.gunviolencearchive.org/

This IS a women's issue – just as much as any other issue we highlight for you.

The Pew Research Center research finds that gun deaths among US children and teenagers increased 50% between 2019 and 2021. In 2019, before the coronavirus pandemic, there were 1,732 gun deaths among U.S. children and teens under the age of 18. By 2021, that figure had increased to 2.590.

The gun death rate among children and teens – a measure that adjusts for changes in the nation's population – rose from 2.4 fatalities per 100,000 minor residents in 2019 to 3.5 per 100,000 two years later, a 46% increase.

Both the number and rate of children and teens killed by gunfire in 2021 were higher than at any point since at least 1999, the earliest year for which information about those younger than 18 is available in the CDC's mortality database.

The year-over-year increase in the U.S. murder rate in 2020 was the largest since at least 1905 – and possibly ever, according to provisional data from the CDC. (Final data is not expected to differ much from the provisional data.) There were 7.8 homicides for every 100,000 people in the United States in 2020, up from six homicides per 100,000 people the year before. The rise in the nation's murder rate last year far exceeded the 20% increase measured in 2001, which was driven by the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11.

The CDC has not yet published the total number of murders in the U.S. in 2020. But according to the FBI, there were 21,570 murders last year, up 29% from 16,669 in 2019 and the highest annual total since 1995. The FBI figures include non negligent homicides as well as murders, but the agency's figures are incomplete because not all law enforcement agencies submit data.

While the Michigan legislature has passed two new bills, the key issue of assault rifles has not been addressed.

To become more involved personally, I would urge each of you to check out The Michigan Coalition to Prevent Gun Violence at https://michigancoalitiontopreventgunviolence.org/ The Michigan Coalition to Prevent Gun Violence (MCPGV) is an affiliate of States United to Prevent Gun Violence, a national non-profit organization focused on supporting state-based gun violence reduction policies and programs.

MCPGV and its partners work collaboratively to prevent gun violence through community education and the development of evidence-based policies.

DUES RENEWAL TIME

Dues renewal started the week of April 24 this year. Around this date you may have received an e-mail from memberinfo@aauw.org. It contains valuable information about renewing your AAUW dues for the fiscal year 2023-24. The dues this year total \$94, which includes \$72 for National, \$12 for state and \$10 for our branch.

The email will give you directions on what to do to renew your membership. This is the preferable method of renewing. Please review your personal information to verify everything is correct including your phone number and email address. This is also where you can find your membership number, which you will need to vote on any National by-law changes.

If you prefer to pay by check, please make your check payable to "AAUWNN" in the amount of \$94 and mail to: **AAUW-NN, PO Box 511, Northville, MI 48167**. I will then deposit the check in our branch checking account and pay your dues to National and State via our debit card.

For tax purposes, \$79 of the \$94 are tax deductible. Your branch dues of \$10 are tax deductible as we are a 501(c)(3) organization and \$69 of the national dues are tax deductible. Three dollars of the \$72 national dues are not deductible because they support the AAUW Action Funds Section 501(c)(4) Lobby Corps. The state dues of \$12 are also not deductible.




