In case you hadn't heard, President Biden signed the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) into law as one of his final acts as President. Here is a little background information and what it might mean.

The ERA is a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States that would guarantee equal rights for women, stating that equal protection under the law shall not be denied on account of gender. Approximately half of the states have something written into their constitutions that prohibit discrimination based on gender, there is nothing specific in the U.S. Constitution.

After the ERA was passed by Congress in 1972, it needed to be ratified by three-fourths (38) of the states within seven years. The deadline was extended to ten years, but only 35 of the 38 states needed had ratified the ERA by the deadline. In January, 2020, Virginia became the 38th state to ratify the ERA. However, Congress never removed or extended the deadline again. Even though President Biden signed it into law on Friday, it seems it still needs to go back to Congress to extend or remove the deadline before it actually becomes part of the U.S. Constitution. We will be watching!





# Public Policy News You Can Use



#### In Michigan

Dec. 30, 2024

Governor Whitmer signed bills expanding protections for Michiganders testifying in the courtroom, and bills combating human trafficking.

Including today's legislation, Governor Whitmer has signed a record 1,431 bipartisan bills into law since taking office.

Senate Bills 515, 516, and 517, sponsored by state Senators Rosemary Bayer (D-West Bloomfield), Sue Shink (D-Northfield Township), and Stephanie Chang (D-Detroit), will combat human trafficking in Michigan and help bring justice for survivors of sexual assault by updating the process to gather and use evidence in prosecuting perpetrators of these crimes. Specifically, the bills ease the rules for a victim's testimony and allow a perpetrator's prior criminal activities as pieces of evidence. Not only will these bills protect survivors of these horrific crimes, but they will also address human trafficking in our state, building a more secure Michigan where everyone can feel safe from sexual violence.

#### In other News

Dec. 29, 2024

The nation mourns the longest and the oldest living past president. At peace, perhaps, but still political: Jimmie Carter vowed he wanted to cast a ballot for Vice President Kamala Harris in the 2024 presidential election.

After serving a single term in the White House, Jimmy Carter became one of the most durable figures in modern American politics. Evicted from the White House at age 56, he would hold the status of former president longer than anyone in U.S. history, and in 2019, he surpassed George H. W. Bush as the nation's oldest living ex-president.

As he approached his 90th birthday, Carter mused about his legacy in an interview with USA TO-DAY. "One is peace," he said. "I kept peace when I was president and I try to promote peace between other people and us, and between countries that were potentially at war, between Israel and Egypt for instance. And human rights. ... I think human rights and peace are the two things I'd like to be remembered for – as well as being a good grandfather."

As we mourn, it is refreshing to hear of the works of a good man.

# Wins for Gun Violence Prevention in Michigan

Following up on the November, 2024 AAUW-NN all member program "Gun Violence Prevention - Researching What Works," Michigan children and neighborhoods will be a little safer because its Senate members worked through the night before the December break to pass "Safe Homes, Safe Schools" or the school notification bill (HB 5450 & 5451), Medicaid funding for Community Violence Intervention (HB 6046) and the gun destruction bill that prohibits resale of weapons seized by law enforcement (HB 6144.5.6).

This is an impressive win. These bills will ensure that parents are informed on how to safely store their guns every year and will enable more sustainable funding for interrupting and healing cycles of violence. Banning bump stocks and banning ghost guns did not pass the House.





#### Dear AAUWNN,

If you just brought your family's shoes, or collected from a few friends, or set out a box at your dentist, hairdresser, insurance agent, church or library (and those required going back numerous times to collect and deliver the shoes), your efforts have been greatly appreciated. We started out with a goal of 2500 pairs of shoes but managed to collect 3,418 pairs! That has netted us \$1628.90.

They were bagged as they came into the garage into 139 opaque bags of 25 pairs each and loaded into a huge truck on January 9, 2025. It was a tremendous job to empty the garage and load them onto the truck – yes, we had to do that. The truck driver stacked them in the truck while our crew tagged and lifted them into the truck. Many thanks to those who performed that task – Evie and Frank Cadicamo, Julie Collins, Jim Kearns, non-member, but good friend, Phyllis Pheeney, Ruth Rickard, Karen Visger, Janice and Jerry Wargo, and Karen and Richard Zyczynski. We cannot imagine doing that without your support.

Jim Kearns was also our photographer, a job he often fulfils so capably,

This was a huge but worthwhile effort because it helps to fund the scholarships, we give to deserving young women in Northville and Novi High Schools and to endowment funds at Schoolcraft and Oakland Community Colleges.




